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


FHP focuses on improving the financial health of Texans. We advocate on behalf of the underserved and provide them with education and resources to achieve financial freedom.

With housing prices skyrocketing, unaffordable health insurance and rising prices for every item on a grocery list, it is important to keep our services available to our community members who are having a hard time making ends meet. Now more than ever it's critical that we embrace collaboration and innovation in every effort so that we can continue improving financial health outcomes for those who are trying to build their path to financial freedom.

In 2022, **Financial Health Pathways** made strides in that quest. We continue to make an impact with our Financial Justice program, and after successfully passing bill SB 1063, which created a new financial education class for high school students, we worked on the implementation of this bill by participating in the creation of the new class while expanding our CARE Junior Academy to new school districts.



Our asset building program I Save Texas! uses incentivized savings as a way to help people build healthy saving habits. This technology-based program has helped many of our clients plan for emergencies while reducing their debt.

Changing systems through

Through innovation, our advocacy arm is creating awareness of critical issues by working with policymakers and representatives of different sectors so that we can incorporate financial inclusion practices into our systems.



In 2022, Financial Health Pathways started the execution of a community assessment to study the financial health of Travis and Williamson counties' residents. The findings will inform policy, financial institutions and philanthropic investments so we can build more inclusive financial systems that will improve health outcomes in our community.

After passing Senate Bill 1063, which created a new financial education class for high school students, FHP was invited to serve on the Social Studies TEKS Review Work Group tasked with developing recommendations for the new course required by the bill, as well as for revisions to the TEKS for the current Personal Financial Literacy and Economics class.

Our CARE Junior Academy (Career Readiness & Exploration) continues to expand its reach, preparing the next generation for the financial challenges they will face as they enter the workforce.


FORMING STRATEGIC PARTNERSHIPS

In 2022 we added Lockhart ISD and the Texas Association of Family, Career and Community Leaders of America in Dallas to our partners network.






